We've elevated and invested in our internal expertise and capacity, refined and streamlined our exceptional model of care, moved forward with new partnerships, and together unlocked the incredible potential of our children and youth. Our steadfast commitment to impact, advocacy, and hope for the kids has yielded life-changing outcomes like you'll see in Nancy's beautiful story. It has also resulted in the award of a first-ever, \$2.1 million Systems Change grant from CalOptima to build a coordinated, youth-centered system of care for Orange County's students experiencing homelessness. All this while increasing our high school graduation rate to 94% for seniors experiencing homelessness which exceeds the national rate by more than 30%.

Though we will always be Becoming, we are very proud of the way that we have lived into this value as team members, community partners, and innovators this past year. Of course, without you, none of this would be possible. Thank you for believing in our vision and our mighty mission. We can't wait to see what this new school year will bring.

Project Hope Alliance deploys a long-term model of care for kids and youth experiencing homelessness in Orange County. Working alongside our education partners, we embed professional case managers directly on school campuses across Orange County to eliminate barriers caused by homelessness that could impede a student's ability to learn and succeed in school. Our mission is rooted in building trusting relationships with youth so we can provide individualized support in the form of academic guidance, social-emotional well-being, and basic life resources from Kindergarten through 24 years of age.

Project Hope Alliance supports students experiencing homelessness across three school districts and one charter school in Orange County.










Youth Served

Earlier this year, Project Hope Alliance was awarded a competitive, three-year \$2.1 million Systems Change Grant from CalOptima, Orange County's largest health insurance provider for low-income residents! This monumental grant will help Project Hope Alliance work closely with the Orange County Department of Education to build a coordinated, youth-centered system of care for Orange County's 23,000+ students experiencing homelessness. We thank CalOptima for recognizing student homelessness as an urgent need in our community. 

Unlocking Potential

Giving back to her community

Nancy first connected with Project Hope Alliance in 2017. She attended Newport Harbor High School however, due to struggles at home, she would miss school frequently and eventually fell behind academically. When money was tight, Nancy and her mom couch-surfed with family and friends. When Nancy turned 18, she was forced to leave home then began couch surfing with friends. Because she was determined to pursue her education, she eventually transferred to Back Bay High School to catch up on credits and she graduated high school on time.

Project Hope Alliance walked alongside Nancy to support her during these challenging moments in her life. We connected her to tutoring services, therapy services, and provided a mobile hotspot to use during the pandemic. Once she caught up on her credits and was ready to graduate high school, Project Hope Alliance covered the cost for her cap and gown so she could celebrate her achievement with her friends. After graduation, Nancy's case manager, Chrissie, supported her with her college and financial aid applications.

When thinking about her future, Nancy knew she always wanted a career in healthcare. Nancy enjoys helping people because people helped her during difficult times. She decided to enroll in a phlebotomy program last year and through hard work, she completed her program! Her last step was to pay for her state license which she could not afford. She eventually shared this with her case

manager Chrissie wondering if Project Hope Alliance had resources. Thanks to generous donors, Project Hope Alliance was able to cover this expense and remove this barrier for Nancy.

Nancy knows her experiences do not define who she is or what she can accomplish. Nancy has big dreams for herself: she wants to help others as a phlebotomist and eventually get her own place. She does not want to struggle like her mom and if she decides to have children someday, she does not want them to experience homelessness like she did.

Nancy recently celebrated her 21st birthday and is eager to begin a new chapter in her life.

FOR OUR KIDS TOGETHER

At Project Hope Alliance, we understand that it takes a collaborative effort to support our youth and families. This year, partnerships ensured our families were not only housed, but prepared for their housing with everything they needed to make their house a home.

Our community partner Serving People In Need (SPIN) provided housing assistance to one of our families at Scholarship Prep. SPIN provided furniture while Trellis, another wonderful partner, provided this family with small appliances, bathroom supplies, as well as linens. Project Hope Alliance was then able to provide additional household items such as curtains, kitchenware, toiletries, and gift cards that the family used to purchase other necessities. Project Hope Alliance has been working with this family for the past few years, supporting youth in their school experiences throughout middle and high school.

It truly takes the love and generosity of partners to ensure our families are housed and transitions are easy. We look forward to continue supporting our youth and ensuring that they are engaged in school, can dream, and thrive!

INTERVIEW WITH KRISTEN CROWE,

What makes Project Hope Alliance a good partner?

special people. There's no judgment at Project Hope Alliance.

What are some outcomes we are working toward together in partnership?

"There is not necessarily one tangible outcome because we are more focused on building a support system around our families. The needs of each student and family are unique and we empower the families to advocate and access resources."

What was your first introduction to Project Hope Alliance?

"From our first conversation, it was apparent that Project Hope
Alliance was committed to youth experiencing homelessness and
our missions were aligned. Our partnership grew out of the urgent
need after the Covid-19 pandemic, when little to no resources
were available to support kids in crisis. Our meaningful
partnership was apparent because we truly understand and
directly support McKinney Vento youth (youth experiencing
homelessness)"



Project Hope Alliance's Inaugural Youth Advisory Council

In 2023, we launched our first Youth Advisory Council. Seven of our youth - ranging from high school juniors to first-year college students - participated in our inaugural Youth Advisory Council to build their leadership skills and infuse their powerful voices into our work.

With guidance from Project Hope Alliance Board Member Dr. Dawn Bounds and our Chief Partnership Officer, Shelby Feliciano-Sabala, our Youth Advisory Council members participated in skill-building workshops focused on their values, goal setting, and public speaking. Youth Advisory Council members also provided valuable feedback about our programming and made suggestions to improve our processes and communication which were implemented.

We are incredibly proud, honored, and grateful for their agency, ideas, and engagement in this work. We are committed to empowering our youth and working alongside them this past year has provided incredible perspective. We can't wait to continue this work alongside our Youth Advisory Council in the new year.

Eliminating Barriers

Keeping families together

Gloria first connected with Project Hope Alliance in 2023. Gloria's three children attend Scholarship Prep Charter School, Project Hope Alliance's partner in Santa Ana. Like some families we support, Gloria is currently undocumented and is able to work to provide for her children because of DACA (deferred action for childhood arrivals). Gloria has maintained her job for several years and works hard to provide for her children so they can complete their education and break the cycle of poverty.

Recently, Gloria opened up to her Project Hope Alliance case manager, Celso, about her struggles. Gloria's DACA status was expiring soon and she did not have enough money for the renewal. She feared losing her job and worse, she feared deportation and her children being without their mother.

Celso immediately took action. He called several legal aid agencies but due to high demand, they could not follow up with Gloria for 5 days. Celso then contacted World Relief Southern California. Celso shared Gloria's story and fortunately, World Relief said they could help Gloria, but everyone needed to move fast.

Celso updated Gloria and asked her to call World Relief Southern California.

Gloria called and received an appointment for the next day. Gloria attended her appointment and was informed that World Relief Southern California would be assisting with the application process and fee to renew her DACA status. Gloria's renewal application was processed on time and her DACA status was renewed. By showing up and supporting Gloria, she continues to work and her kids continue to focus on their education.

Gloria's next goal is to become a legal resident and her dream is for all three of her kids to go to college.






Adventures, memories, and a SUMMER FOR THE KIDS

From the first time Sarah met her Project Hope Alliance case manager, Natalie, Sarah felt comfortable and knew Natalie was someone she could trust. Sarah quickly shared that she and her family were sleeping in their car. Despite their challenging living situation, Sarah maintains a positive outlook on life. When Sarah is not doing homework in Natalie's office or participating in school programs, she is part of the soccer and track team.

During a recent meeting with Natalie, Sarah started rubbing her left foot. Sarah shared that her feet were hurting from practice. She explained that she was wearing Converse sneakers at practice because they were her only shoes and her family couldn't afford to buy her new running shoes. Natalie knew that Converse were not adequate running shoes and after looking at Sarah's shoes, Natalie could also see that they were in poor condition.

To provide Sarah immediate relief, Natalie gave her a new pair of Vans that were recently donated to Project Hope Alliance. Natalie assured Sarah that she would seek additional resources for proper running shoes. After reaching out to a donor and sharing her story, the donor provided a brand-new pair of athletic

shoes for Sarah the very next day.

Sarah is bright and committed to her education. One of Sarah's goals is to improve her attendance; she knows with her dedication to her education and her teams along with Project Hope Alliance's support, she will accomplish her goal. Sarah's dream is to graduate high school and secure an athletic scholarship so that one day she can play soccer professionally.

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
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
